Tour the bays of Woy Woy

Woy Woy has been a tourist attraction for those living in Sydney since the late 1800s. The settlements opposite the Woy Woy railway station: Woy Woy Bay, Phegans Bay, Horsfield Bay and Waterfall Bay were popular destinations. Tourists could travel to Woy Woy by streamer from Sydney or by train from 1889, when the bridge across the Hawkesbury River was opened. Attractions were advertised as the beauty of the area, fishing, cycling and shooting. Pleasure seekers would take ferries across to holiday houses or camp sites at the bays. Road transport only arrived at Phegans Bay in 1924 while Woy Woy Bay residents had to wait until 1932 for road access.

Launch your kayak from the Lions Park at Woy Woy or near the railway bridge just north of Woy Woy.

Things to do

Explore the far reaches of the bays. Experience the serenity and the natural beauty of Waterfall Bay. Have lunch and a swim at the waterfall.

Explore the ruins at the head of Woy Woy Bay.

Try fishing at the railway bridge. Great for flathead.

Distances from the railway bridge to the far reaches of the bay

To Waterfall Bay 2.5 km (approximate)

To Woy Woy Inlet 3.75 km (approximate)

To Woy Woy Bay 2.6 km (approximate)

It is one kilometre from the Lions Park to the railway bridge.
